Lots of ski resorts, especially those in California, were open until Memorial Day. Here is the short list:

Killington. The Beast of the East, stayed open due to a great deal of snow farming to provide skiing on Super Star.

Arapahoe Basin skied through May along with Arizona Snowbowl, Palisades Tahoe, Snowbird Utah, Timberline Basin in Oregon with an 88" base at 6,000'. Mammoth with 10 lifts spinning providing service to 86 trails. It was quite a ski season.

Beartooth Basin opened on Memorial Day weekend and will remain open throughout the summer since that is their normal ski season. If you haven't heard Beartooth is a summer only ski resort. Anyone for summer skiing? Beartooth Basin opened in the mid 60's by Austrians Pepi Sailor and Anderl Molterer for use as a training ground for Alpine Ski Racing Summer camp. It is one of the oldest North American ski training areas. A younger generation of skiers wanted to open the area to the public and when they took over control of the area they staffed it with lift operators and a ski patrol. There is lots more history to be found on their web site.


Each day was full of exciting adventures. Early on the second day, we boarded an elegant coach bus and travelled to Tortuguero National Park, encompassing eleven different habitats. On the way, we passed several banana plantations, with Jorge providing valuable commentary along the way and stopping to dig a Hercules Beetle out of the tree to bring into the bus to amaze us and let us take pictures. The final leg of our journey included a 1 ½ hour boat ride to get to our hotel, seeing wildlife and jungle vegetation all along the way. We spent two days in Tortuguero, including bird walks, canal cruises for up-close viewing of jungle flora and fauna, a talk from a local naturalist, and hanging by the pool watching the monkeys play (see photo below). We obtained and surprised Jorge with a birthday cake on his day!

On day four, we traveled to the Sarapiqui region via boat initially, to where our luxurious coach bus awaited us. We then toured an organic pineapple farm, afterward partaking in delicious pina coladas made with fresh pineapple. We arrived at our lush hotel, in the middle of a rainforest jungle. The next day, Jorge led us on a hike (see photo below) through lava fields, to take pictures at a spot with a view of the still active (but not dangerous at this time) Arenal Volcano. Jorge warned us that most times, Arenal's top was covered in clouds, but we had a sunny day with great visibility (photo below). Only 3% of the world's population has ever seen an active volcano! In the evening we drove to nearby Ecotermales Hot Springs for a dip in the wonderful pools and dinner afterwards. Optional excursions the next day included horseback riding, zip lining, rafting, or lounging by the hotel pools.

On day six, we traveled to Monteverde, 5000 ft elevation in the Santa Elena Cloud Forest, where we stayed for two days. Along the way, we had a private cooking class and explored the Cloud Forest via 6 Sky Walk Hanging Bridges. What a thrill! During our stay in Monteverde, we had a group dinner at a nearby restaurant made possible by Trip Leader, Alexa Fair, and an optional coffee/cocoa/sugar cane plantation visit. On the last day in Monteverde, we enjoyed the farewell dinner by Globus.

Overall, our trip to Costa Rica was an enormous success. Look at all our happy faces (see photo below). A beautiful and incredible biodiverse country. I highly recommend visiting, but better yet please join us on another tour with the Columbia Ski Club Getaway and Adventures Group!

Pass Details

• Note that Ikon Base and Ikon Base Plus include only 5 days of skiing for each destination. Members wishing to ski 6 days on a trip must purchase the full Ikon Pass, which allows up to 7 days.

• Members wishing to ski at Telluride must buy a full Epic Pass, because the Epic

Local pass does not allow access to Telluride.

• Members wishing to ski at Jackson Hole or Taos must purchase an Ikon Base Plus pass.


• Pricing for both Epic and Ikon can increase on a month-to-month basis, often without notice. The best advice is to purchase early.

Lift Pricing

Each trip has a different lift pricing approach. Destinations that use the Epic Pass offer attractive lodging rebates when the pass is purchased through the tour operator. Details will be available from the Trip Leader when they are assigned on June 5th.
